FAREWELLING THE WHAKATŌHEA MĀORI TRUST BOARD

On 2 November, whānau gathered in the early hours to bid a final farewell to the Whakatōhea Māori Trust Board. The morning began with karakia and speeches honouring past Trustees and staff who have served the trust board since its inception. This was a solemn yet significant moment as the new name, Te Tāwharau o Te Whakatōhea, was unveiled above the doorway, alongside a commemorative plaque acknowledging all past Trustees.



The ceremony was followed by a gathering at Waiaua Marae, where over 100 whānau attended, many returning home to acknowledge and celebrate their tīpuna and their contributions to Whakatōhea; the event followed an exceptional hākari and kōrero. A highlight of the day was a powerful rangatahi panel discussion. The message from our rangatahi was clear: "Get on with it, heal the rifts, because we've got work to do."




FIRST AGM AS TE TĀWHARAU O TE WHAKATŌHEA

On 14 December, we held our first Annual General Meeting (AGM) as Te Tāwharau o Te Whakatōhea at Maromahue Marae. The day was perfect and set the tone for a well-received AGM. This event was a significant milestone, as it marked the first full 12-month report from Te Tāwharau o Te Whakatōhea, alongside the final report from the Whakatōhea Māori Trust Board.

This was the final official duty of the outgoing trust board. It was a poignant moment to collectively acknowledge and thank all Trustees and staff for their service since the Board's establishment.
